

Are the fiber optic cable and router compatible

For optimal performance, consider a router that supports gigabit or multi-gigabit speeds, modern Wi-Fi standards (Wi-Fi 6 or Wi-Fi 7), and sufficient LAN ports for wired connections . Some routers also support SFP/SFP+ modules, which can directly interface with fiber in advanced setups, though most residential installations use the ONT-to-Ethernet method .

Connection Steps

- o Install the ONT: Connect the fiber optic cable from the wall outlet to the ONT and power it on.
- o Connect the Router: Use an Ethernet cable to link the ONT's Ethernet port to your router's WAN port.
- o Configure the Router: Power on the router and access its settings to ensure proper network configuration. Enable QoS or other features if needed for gaming or streaming .

Key Considerations

- o Ensure your router can handle the maximum speed of your fiber plan.
- o The ONT is essential; without it, the router cannot interpret fiber signals.
- o For multi-gigabit fiber, routers with 10G LAN/WAN ports or LAN aggregation may be required to fully utilize the connection . In summary, fiber optic cables are compatible with routers through an ONT, and most
