Brazil is advancing multiple submarine fiber optic projects, including offshore oil platform networks, international links to the US, and Amazonian connectivity initiatives, enhancing both industrial and public digital infrastructure.

Offshore Oil and Gas Connectivity

The Petrobras Malha Optica project is a major initiative connecting offshore oil and gas platforms in the Campos Basin. Managed by Blue Marine Telecom and supported by Pioneer Consulting, the project involves a 440-kilometer repeaterless trunk-and-branch system linking 12 production platforms to cable landing stations in Anchieta, Espirito Santo, and Barra do Furado, Rio de Janeiro. The system uses advanced repeaterless fiber-optic technology with remote optically pumped amplifiers and Raman amplification, modernizing connectivity and allowing future platform expansion. Completion is expected by early 2025, enhancing safety, automation, and monitoring for offshore operations .

International Submarine Cable: Brazil-US

The Synapse Submarine Cable System, led by Brazilian operator V.tal, will span approximately 9,700 kilometers between Sao Paulo, Brazil, and Tuckerton, New Jersey, USA. Designed with 16 fiber pairs and an initial capacity of 320 Tbps, the system supports circuits up to 800 Gbps using Space Division Multiplexing (SDM) and Open Cable technology. A planned 460-kilometer branching unit near Fortaleza will connect the Mega Lobster data center, positioning Fortaleza as a key international connectivity hub. This project addresses growing demand for cloud and AI services and strengthens digital ties between North and South America .

Amazonian Digital Connectivity

In the Brazilian Amazon, a partnership between the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) and the Agence Francaise de Developpement (AFD) is co-financing submarine fiber optic projects in Maranhao and Para. The initiative will deploy 350-500 kilometers of cables and establish a regional data center, providing fast internet access to approximately 15 million people, including Indigenous communities, quilombola settlements, and riverside populations. The project aims to expand online education, telemedicine, and e-commerce, while connecting Brazil, French Guiana, and Europe to reduce regional digital inequalities .

These projects collectively enhance Brazil's industrial, commercial, and public digital infrastructure. Offshore networks improve operational efficiency and safety in oil and gas production, international cables support high-capacity data transport for cloud and AI applications, and Amazonian connectivity promotes social
