

Can an electrical distribution box be installed in a stairwell

Article Overview

Electrical distribution boxes cannot be installed directly over stair steps, and their placement in stairwells is heavily restricted by code and safety requirements.

NEC and Safety Considerations

According to the National Electrical Code (NEC), overcurrent protective devices such as panelboards cannot be installed over the steps of a stairway (NEC 240.24(F)), . The panel must have a clear working space in front of it, typically 30 inches wide, 36 inches deep, and 6.5 feet high, to allow safe access for servicing (NEC 110.26(A)), . Installing a panel directly on stairs or in a confined under-stair area often fails to meet these clearance requirements due to limited floor space and headroom .

Stairwell and Egress Restrictions

Building codes generally prohibit placing electrical panels in stairways or other means of egress unless the equipment specifically serves the stairway, such as lighting or pressurization systems . Stairwells are considered exit routes, and placing a panel there could obstruct safe evacuation. Even if the panel is recessed, it may void the fire rating of the stairway if it is fire-rated .

Practical Installation Options

- o Landing Placement: A panel can be installed on a stair landing if it does not interfere with steps and maintains the required working space .
- o Alternative Locations: Consider placing the distribution box in a nearby hallway, utility room, or closet that is dry, accessible, and free from combustible materials .
- o Clearances: Ensure the panel's door can open fully (90?) and that no appliances or stored items infringe on the required service area .
