To configure a core switch, you typically use a console cable rather than a standard network cable. This cable connects your computer to the switch's console port, allowing access to the command-line interface (CLI) for setup and management . Steps include:

- o Connect the console cable from your computer's serial or USB port to the switch's console port.
- o Launch terminal emulation software (e.g., PuTTY, Tera Term).
- o Access the CLI to configure interfaces, IP addresses, and other settings.
