Standard household electrical boxes typically measure 2-2.25 inches wide, 3.75-4 inches high, with depths ranging from 1.5 to 3.5 inches depending on wire volume.

Common Box Types and Dimensions

Single-Gang Boxes: These are the most common for one switch or outlet. The face dimensions are usually 2-2.25 inches wide by 3.75-4 inches high, with depths ranging from 1.5 to 3.5 inches to accommodate different wire counts and devices like GFCIs or smart switches . Internal volume is critical for safety and NEC compliance, typically around 18 cubic inches for standard outlets . **Double-Gang Boxes:** Designed for two devices side by side, such as a switch and an outlet. Width is generally 4 inches, with height similar to single-gang boxes, and depth varying according to wiring needs . **Three- and Four-Gang Boxes:** Width increases with each additional gang: 3-gang boxes are approximately 5.5-5.8125 inches wide, and 4-gang boxes measure 7.3125-7.625 inches wide. Depth is selected based on wire fill requirements to maintain safety . **Junction Boxes:** Often square, commonly 4 x 4 inches, with multiple depth options. These provide extra internal volume for splicing multiple wires and are used for ceiling fixtures, fans, or complex wiring junctions .

Depth and Internal Volume Considerations

Depth is the most variable dimension and directly affects internal volume, which is crucial for safely housing conductors, grounding wires, and devices. NEC Table 314.16(A) specifies that box volume must accommodate all conductors and devices to prevent overheating . Typical depths include:

- o Shallow: 1.5 inches
 - o Standard: 2.5 inches
 - o Deep: 3.5 inches
- Choosing a deeper box is recommended when multiple wires converge or when installing devices that require more space behind the wall .

Summary

For most residential applications, single-gang boxes measure roughly 2-2.25" x 3.75-4", with depth 1.5-3.5". Multi-gang boxes increase in width proportionally, while junction boxes often use a 4 x 4" footprint with variable depth. Always consider internal volume and NEC requirements to ensure safe and code-compliant installations .
