

Article Overview

An elevator entrance electrical distribution box reserved is a dedicated panelboard that supplies and protects electrical power specifically for elevator systems, ensuring compliance with safety codes and operational reliability.

Purpose and Function

A reserved electrical distribution box for an elevator serves as the central point for power distribution to the elevator's motor, control circuits, lighting, and safety systems. It integrates overcurrent protection, surge protection, and metering, ensuring that the elevator receives stable and safe electrical power while isolating it from other building circuits. This dedicated box prevents interference from other loads and allows for easier maintenance and troubleshooting.

Design and Components

Modern elevator panelboards are designed to meet UL 67 and NEMA PB1 standards and may include:

- o Main breakers (fixed or drawout MCCBs) rated for 20 A to 600 A or higher
- o Branch circuit breakers for lighting, control, and auxiliary systems
- o Integrated metering and surge protection to monitor and safeguard the system
- o Front-accessible, wall-mounted design for easy maintenance and compliance with space requirements

Installation and Code Compliance

The installation of a reserved elevator distribution box must comply with local and national electrical codes, such as the NEC 620.37 or Oregon Electrical Specialty Code (OESC) for hoistways and machine rooms. Key requirements include:

- o Only wiring directly associated with the elevator may enter the machine room or hoistway.
- o Conduits and raceways should only enter to the extent necessary to connect elevator devices.
- o Proper labeling and accessibility for maintenance and emergency shutdowns.
- o Compliance with fire-rated cable requirements and ADA standards for associated communication devices.

Integration with Elevator Systems

The reserved distribution box connects to the elevator control panel, which manages vertical movement, door operations, and safety interlocks. It ensures that all elevator subsystems, including emergency

communication, lighting, and motor control, are powered reliably and safely. Proper design and installation reduce downtime, enhance passenger safety, and extend the life of elevator components .
