

Exposed cables in cable trays

Article Overview

Cables installed in cable trays can be exposed if they are rated for open-air use, properly secured, and protected from mechanical damage, sunlight, and environmental hazards.

Regulatory and Code Requirements

According to OSHA and NEC standards, only certain types of cables are permitted in cable trays, including armored cable, tray-rated (Type TC) cables, metal-clad (MC) cables, power-limited tray cables, and optical fiber cables. Single-conductor cables and multiconductor cables may also be installed in ladder or ventilated trays if they are listed for tray use and sunlight-resistant when exposed outdoors (OSHA 1910.305) . Cable trays must remain accessible and not enclosed, and they cannot be installed in hoistways or areas subject to severe physical damage .

Exposure and Protection

Exposed cables are allowed in cable trays, but they must be secured to prevent movement and protected from mechanical damage. For example, TC-ER-rated cables can be run exposed outside the tray for short distances (up to 6 feet) without conduit, provided they are fastened and shielded from impacts . In outdoor installations, cables must be sunlight-resistant, and in high-risk areas, additional protection such as conduit may be required .

Safety Considerations

Proper cable management is essential to prevent insulation damage, short circuits, or overheating. Cables should be arranged with adequate spacing, and insulating barriers may be used to reduce the risk of electrical shorts . High-power and low-power cables should be separated to prevent electromagnetic interference (EMI), and fill limits must be observed (typically 40% for power cables and 50% for control cables) .

Summary

- o Cables are listed and rated for tray use and, if outdoors, sunlight-resistant.

- o Cable trays remain accessible for maintenance and inspection.

- o Conduit or additional protection is used in high-risk, outdoor, or underground locations . Following these guidelines ensures compliance with NEC and OSHA standards while maintaining safe and reliable cable

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installations.
