- o Protective Enclosure: Durable housing, often IP-rated, for indoor or outdoor deployment .

Types and Mounting Options

Fiber optic terminal boxes can be wall-mounted, pole-mounted, or rack-mounted, depending on the deployment environment . They vary in capacity, ranging from a few ports (e.g., 4-8 for small MDUs) to dozens of ports for larger installations. They can also be classified as straight-type (single external hole) or branched-type (multiple holes), and come in plastic or metal shells for indoor or outdoor use .

The terminal box serves as the last structured node before the subscriber, providing strain relief, bend-radius control, slack storage, and easy access for testing and maintenance . It ensures low insertion loss and high return loss for optical signals, supporting reliable and efficient fiber optic communication.
