

How far apart should cable trays and brackets be

Cable tray brackets should generally be fixed 1.5 to 2.5 meters apart, with closer spacing for heavier loads or horizontal runs.

Recommended Spacing

- o Horizontal runs: Brackets are typically spaced every 300-400 mm for light cables and 1-1.5 meters for standard trays, depending on cable weight and tray material .
- o Vertical runs: Brackets can be spaced slightly further apart, around 500-600 mm, as vertical orientation reduces sagging risk .

- o Installation Environment: Vibration, wind, temperature fluctuations, or corrosive conditions may necessitate closer bracket spacing .
- o Future Expansion: Consider potential additional cables; closer spacing now can prevent sagging when more cables are added later .
- o Regulatory Compliance: Ensure spacing meets local electrical codes and standards, such as BS 7671 or IEC guidelines .

Practical Tips

- o Always secure brackets to solid structures like joists, battens, or concrete walls to prevent loosening over time .
- o Use corrosion-resistant finishes (e.g., hot-dip galvanized) in wet or outdoor environments .
- o For ladder-type trays, the tray depth and sidewall height also influence load capacity and may allow slightly wider spacing .
- o Maintain a safety margin of at least 25% above the expected load to account for future cable additions . By assessing cable weight, tray type, orientation, and environmental conditions, you can determine the optimal bracket spacing to ensure safety, structural integrity, and cost efficiency .
