

How many megabits does a 100Mbps fiber optic router have

For a 100 Mbps fiber optic connection, a router with at least a 100 Mbps WAN port is sufficient, though a Gigabit (1000 Mbps) router is recommended for future-proofing and optimal Wi-Fi performance.

Router WAN Port Requirements

A router's WAN port determines the maximum internet speed it can handle. For a 100 Mbps fiber connection, a Fast Ethernet WAN port (100 Mbps) can fully utilize the connection without limiting speed. However, if you plan to upgrade your internet in the future or want better internal network performance, a Gigabit WAN port (1000 Mbps) is recommended, as it supports higher speeds and ensures no bottleneck between your ISP and your devices (TP-Link) .

Wi-Fi Standards and Wireless Speeds

The router's wireless standard affects the speed between your devices and the router, not the ISP speed. Common standards include:

- o Wi-Fi 4 (802.11n): Theoretical max ~600 Mbps, real-world speeds lower.
- o Wi-Fi 5 (802.11ac): Theoretical max ~3.5 Gbps.
- o Wi-Fi 6 (802.11ax): Theoretical max ~9.6 Gbps, real-world speeds around 1,200 Mbps with compatible devices . Even with a 100 Mbps fiber connection, using a Wi-Fi 5 or Wi-Fi 6 router ensures that your devices can achieve the full ISP speed wirelessly, especially in multi-device households.

Device Count and Bandwidth Considerations

A 100 Mbps connection comfortably supports 2-3 simultaneous HD streams or 5-7 devices performing everyday tasks. For households with many devices or multiple 4K streams, a higher-capacity router and faster plan may be needed to avoid congestion . As a rule of thumb, allocate roughly 10 Mbps per active device to estimate your bandwidth needs.

Practical Recommendation

- o Minimum: Router with 100 Mbps WAN port and Wi-Fi 4 for small households.
- o Recommended: Router with Gigabit WAN port and Wi-Fi 5 or Wi-Fi 6 for better wireless performance, future-proofing, and multiple devices.
- o Optional: Consider mesh Wi-Fi systems if you have a large home or multiple floors to maintain consistent speeds. By choosing a router with at least a Gigabit WAN port and modern Wi-Fi standard, you ensure that



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your 100 Mbps fiber connection is fully utilized and your network remains efficient as device usage grows.
