

# How to open the cover of a stainless steel cable tray

## Article Overview

Most stainless steel cable tray covers can be opened by releasing clamps or quarter-turn latches, allowing safe access to the cables inside.

## Identify the Cover Type and Latching Mechanism

Stainless steel cable trays may have flat, sloped, or perforated covers. Covers are typically secured using quarter-turn latches, fixing clamps, or screws depending on the model and manufacturer . Before attempting to open the cover, inspect it to determine the type of fastener used.

## Steps to Open the Cover

- o Ensure Safety: Turn off power to the cables in the tray if possible to prevent electrical hazards.
- o Locate Fasteners: Identify all clamps, latches, or screws along the length of the tray cover. Some trays use RS PRO fixing clamps that permanently attach the cover, while others use quarter-turn latches for easy removal .
- o Release Latches or Clamps:
  - o For quarter-turn latches, rotate the latch 90 degrees to unlock the cover.
  - o For clamps, use a screwdriver or appropriate tool to loosen or remove the clamp.
- o Lift the Cover: Once all fasteners are released, carefully lift the cover. For long trays, it may be helpful to have a second person to support the cover to prevent bending or damage.
- o Access Cables: With the cover removed, you can inspect, add, or remove cables as needed. Ensure cables are not pinched or stressed when replacing the cover.

## Reinstalling the Cover

After work is complete, align the cover properly and secure all latches or clamps. Ensure the cover sits flush with the tray to maintain protection and prevent accidental dislodging .

## Additional Tips

- o Ventilated or mesh trays allow easier access since cables can often be reached without fully removing the cover .
- o Corrosion-resistant stainless steel (grades 304 or 316) ensures durability even in harsh environments, so avoid using excessive force when opening the cover .
- o Regular maintenance: Periodically check latches and clamps for wear to ensure the cover remains secure. By following these steps, you can safely and efficiently open a stainless steel cable tray cover for maintenance or
