

How to route cables after they exit the cable tray

Cables can be routed out of a cable tray using designated exit points, bends, or drop-outs while maintaining proper support, separation, and bend radius to ensure safety and performance.

Identify the Exit Point

Determine where the cables need to leave the tray to reach equipment or junction boxes. Cable trays allow cables to enter and exit at any point along the route, providing flexibility in design and minimizing the need for additional supports .

Use Proper Accessories

- o Drop-outs or elbows: These are designed to guide cables smoothly out of the tray without sharp bends, reducing stress on the cable insulation .
- o Cable tray covers or guards: If the exit is in a high-traffic area, covers can protect cables from mechanical damage .

Maintain Bend Radius

Ensure that the cable bend radius is not exceeded when exiting the tray. Sharp bends can damage insulation or reduce signal quality, especially for data or instrumentation cables . Use radius elbows or flexible conduits if necessary.

Support and Secure Cables

Once the cables leave the tray, they should be supported with clamps, hooks, or conduits to prevent sagging or mechanical stress. Proper support also helps maintain separation between power and instrumentation cables to reduce electromagnetic interference .

Plan for Separation and Safety

- o Electrical vs. instrumentation cables: Keep power cables above and signal cables below, or use dividers to prevent interference .
- o Spacing: Maintain recommended vertical and horizontal distances when exiting multiple trays to avoid heat buildup and ensure safety .

Final Steps

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- o Label cables for easy identification and future maintenance.
- o Ensure all exits comply with local electrical codes and standards.
- o Verify that the exit path allows for future upgrades or additional cables without overcrowding . By following these steps, cables can be routed out of a cable tray efficiently, safely, and in a way that preserves cable integrity and system performance.
