



The electrical distribution box must be installed inside the house

Electrical distribution boxes (breaker panels) do not have to be installed inside the house, but they must comply with NEC and local code requirements for accessibility, clearance, and safety.

Indoor vs. Outdoor Installation

Electrical panels can be installed inside or outside a home, depending on local building codes and environmental considerations. While many homes place panels in unfinished basements, garages, or utility rooms, outdoor installations are allowed if the panel is weatherproof and rated for exterior use (IP/NEMA-rated) to protect against moisture and dust. Indoor installation is common because it provides easier access, protection from weather, and compliance with standard NEC requirements.

Location Restrictions

Panels cannot be installed in bathrooms, closets, or inside cabinets, nor should they be placed above shelving or near sump pump pits. The area around the panel must be readily accessible, with a minimum clearance of 30 inches wide, 36 inches deep, and 6.5 feet high in front of the panel. Proper lighting must be provided for safe operation and maintenance.

Mounting Height and Accessibility

The center handle of the highest breaker should not exceed 6 feet 7 inches (2 meters) above the floor, and the panel should be mounted at a minimum height of 4 feet from the floor. The panel door must open 90 degrees without obstruction. These requirements ensure safe and convenient access for operation and emergency shutdowns.

Safety and Compliance

Regardless of indoor or outdoor placement, the panel must be firmly secured, properly grounded, and installed according to the NEC, IEC, or local codes. Each circuit should have its own protection device (breaker or fuse), and the panel should be labeled clearly for all circuits. Regular inspections and maintenance are recommended to ensure long-term reliability.

Summary

While indoor installation is common, it is not strictly mandatory. The key is that the distribution box must be accessible, safe, and compliant with NEC and local codes, whether installed inside a house or outdoors in a



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suitable enclosure .
