- o Signal attenuation: Reduced signal strength due to improper light propagation and interference from cladding modes .
- o Data errors and latency: Especially in high-speed data centers, short cords may compromise the integrity of 10G-400G links .
- o Physical stress: Short cords may be stretched or bent excessively, increasing the risk of microbends or connector damage .

## Best Practices

- o Always use patch cords that meet or exceed the minimum recommended length.
- o Coil any excess fiber to prevent sharp bends and maintain signal integrity.
- o Inspect connectors and ensure proper alignment to minimize insertion loss.
- o For high-speed or dense data center environments, follow manufacturer guidelines for both length and type of fiber (single-mode vs. multimode) to avoid performance degradation .
